Charlie has been a great contributor to the Club, not only to the WhatsApp group, but opening the bowling and middle order battling. I wish him well with his new adventures and hope he returns safely to the Green sometime next year.

The batting line up has been extraordinarily strong this year with many players sharing the top six batting positions. The most notable were the contributions made by our talented youngsters, Will Cutlan-Smyth and Olly Hartnell. Will single handily batted Matching to the final of the Boardman's Davis Cup and has brilliantly taken up the role as the First Team wicket-keeper. He has planned and coached the first team as a squad, inclusive of both talented youngsters and established players. There has been one notable addition to the club's coaching line up this year; ex-England, Essex and Middlesex batsman Oasis Shah. Owais has been coaching the more talented youngsters and our first team throughout the season. His insight and coaching has assisted our young 15-17 year olds and helped take their game to a new level. Olly, as leading run-scorer this year, is testament to that. My thanks go out to Owais; always generous with his time and sharing his gems of advice through rain or shine and often until dusk. I wish Owais well this winter and we look forward to welcoming him back to the Green again next year.

This winter will prove to be difficult for many, but as a Club we will continue to offer regular social events online and indoor nets, even if competitive adult indoor cricket will not go ahead. ## The view from behind the stumps

Although I have umpired a number of juniors games in the past, my foray into 'proper' umpiring began, during lockdown, by taking the on-line ECB course and then being asked by Riz whether I would consider umpiring for the first team this season. I suspect that was more to do with giving Riz an excuse not to pick me for any games and hence avoiding the difficulty of explaining I am actually rubbish at playing!

The first game was against arch rivals, Nazeing Common, and early in the game I need to make my first decision. Riz misses one and after a loud appeal and long deliberation I give him out, caught behind. Riz 'gives me daggers' and walks off shaking his head. I think to myself "Oh I might have got that wrong" only to be told by Riz later that he did in fact glove it. Thanks Riz!

## So what I have learnt during my first season as an umpire?

Some players don't know the rules. For example, having given a batsman "not-out" to a loud appeal for LBW I was asked why, considering that he wasn't playing a stroke. I explained that the ball wasn't hitting the stumps only to be questioned again with "but he didn't play a stroke". I think this particular bowler believed that if the batsman didn't play a stroke then all the ball had to do was hit the pad to be given out. Other things I have been told include:

- A 'no-ball' that goes through for four runs without hitting the bat isn't signalled as no-ball, byes and four runs. It is!
- The bowlers back foot landing outside of the return crease isn't a 'no-ball'. It is!

2 Some players have an inconsistent view of 'consistency'. Having signalled 'Dead-Ball' after their batsman played no-stroke to the ball hitting his pads, the opposition 'demanded' that I also signal 'Dead-Ball' when the ball hit the pads of a MGCC batsman, despite the batsman having a big 'swing and a miss'. "But you're not being consistent" claimed the bowler. I tried in vain to explain the difference!

Dialogue with the players helps. Most, but not all bowlers, like to be told when they getting close to a 'front-foot' no-ball. I say most bowlers as there was one, nameless bowler who said in a frustrated tone "stop talking to me. If I overstep just call it". Which I did next ball as he sent the middle stump cartwheeling! Asking the batsman whether he hit it also helps with leg-bye decisions, although there are some batsmen who claim to have 'middled' everything unless, of course, it was an edge to the keeper!

Batsmen and bowlers have a view regarding LBW decisions but the person in the absolutely best position to make a decision is the non-strikers end umpire.



The non-striking batsman has a good view but also isn't in-line with the stumps. So, as a batsman/bowler, you might believe that it pitched 'outside leg' but I reckon I have a better view than you. I would reiterate this to the nameless bowler who bowled, tripped in his follow through, did a forward roll and still appealed for LBW.

5 Standing for 6 hours is actually physically demanding, particularly for somebody who has spent the majority of their life behind a desk and, especially if umpiring 'both ends', is mentally taxing. I confess there has been more than one occasion this season where I thought "blimey I am glad there was no appeal that time" as I had total zoned out and had no idea what had happened!

The vast majority of players, despite getting quite emotional in the heat of the moment, are decent chaps. More than once I have been given an earful or been on the receiving end of a sarcastic comment from a bowler, only for him to apologise at the end of the over. The plonker from High Roding who, when being given out LBW (by one of his team not me I hasten to add), claimed that he had 'middled' it and demanded that we rescind the appeal before storming off, claiming we were "accusing him of lying" and we were 'cheating \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*, spouting a further torrent of abuse before launching his pad and bat into orbit, cannot be categorised as a 'decent chap' by any means.

Z Lordy, in his mind at least, when batting, is never out and, when bowling, every ball hitting the pads is 'plumb'.

I must say it has been a thoroughly enjoyable experience and, it definitely enables you to be totally involved in the game without playing. You get a great perspective for the game and you see the battle between bat and ball close up. I know spectators or players may think they see what is going on but there is nobody better positioned to see this that the umpires, especially the non-strikers end umpire.

So if you feel you got the rough end of any of my decisions this summer I apologise but can assure you it wasn't personal, even if you do support Arsenal. During the winter I will be syringing my ears and exercising my eyes ready for a, hopefully, longer season next year.










## C. Bass returns for the summer

# An A-Z of village cricket

Sometimes the jargon of cricket can be quite overwhelming for anyone new to the game. So we've put together a little village cricket dictionary to help the uninitiated get to grips with the language of the not-so-beautiful game.

## **Agricultural**

Ugly but effective. Generally, it's when the batsman swings at a ball outside off stump and hacks it over the legside with 'all the grace of a reversing dump truck'. Not one for the purists.

## **Badger**

Lives and breathes cricket. Wakes up every morning and checks his Play-Cricket average... it's still 10.21.

#### Cat

The old bloke in the team who still gets a run out every week. Every time the ball approaches he pounces on it and underarms it

back to the gloves (see keeper).

#### Down-the-throat

The ball loops up from an ill-advised lofted drive and it's a simple catch at mid-off. Straight down the fielder's throat... still manages to drop it though.

#### Eleven

Number of players you have on a Friday night for your 1pm game on Saturday. Eight is the number you have on Saturday morning when one is hungover, one has to look after the kids and the other has no transport to the game. Anyone that's skippered knows about this one!

## **Fishing**

'Wait for the bad ball.' The non-striker says trying to calm your nerves as you've viciously hit out at the last three balls on a good length outside off. You've no longer got a bat in your hands but a rod, you're fishing for the ball.

#### Gun

Best player on the pitch. He's Barry's best-mate's son who's just in town for the weekend, used to play for Gloucestershire U14s, bats, bowls, can keep if you need him to as well, played a season of Grade Cricket too. Unfortunately your skipper fancies himself today so gives him 5 overs to bat at the end and only bowls him 3rd change.



#### **Howzat!**

The correct way to appeal for an LBW or catch behind. Often gargled by the alcoholic at 2nd slip becoming any sort of exclamation if the ball passes the outside of the bat. The Umpire gives it not out.

#### **Inches**

Fresh from being hit back over his head for 6, the next ball is generously left well outside the stumps by their best (see Gun) bat. The bowler howls and cries 'INCHES'. Clearly a man who has a better understanding of metric rather than imperial.

## Jaffa

Also known as: 'Rip-snorter', 'Bamboozeler' or 'Corker'. A ball that is completely unplayable; swings in, then out, fizzes, dips, seams and turns the wrong way. At least that's what your number 8 says as he gets another single figure score.

## Keeper

Arguably the most under-valued member of the team. Wicketkeepers are constantly involved in the game, but their hard work often goes unnoticed. However, one mistake and everyone knows about it.

#### Loosener

The first ball of your opening bowler's spell. It flies fast, wide and to the boundary. 'Sorry mate... loosener!' He shouts to the Captain. Goes on to bowl another 3 in the over.

#### Minefield

The pitch has been prepared by the only man in the club willing to do it. Mad Phil. No one knows what he does for a job but he's definitely not a groundsman. A par score on the ground is 85 and hopefully someone doesn't fall into a badger set.

#### **Nibble**

Has multiple meanings...

- 1. The pitch is doing a bit, slight movement away from the military medium second change, movement he hasn't seen since 2006.
- 2. You've been trying to get in the batsman's head the whole innings, a little comment here and there, finally a little 'shut up' under his breath. He may

be winning the war but you've won the battle.



## **Unplayable**

The moon ball. Looks like it's there to be hit. You miss. You're bowled.

## **Village**

The lowest form of the game. Missed catches, bad throws, dodgy umpiring decisions, stupid shots. Wouldn't change it for the world.

#### Offie

Where the captain goes during tea to grab some fags and a can of Stella after you've been bowled out for under 100 again.

### **Pies**

You have your 5 bowling options. Perfect. Until your opening bowler injures himself fielding on the boundary and you need 3 overs from someone. You turn, begrudgingly to the pie chucker. Usually only bowls during inter-club games where he gets smashed all over the park. Exhale... let's get through this, everyone out on the boundary.

## Quality

A sight seldom seen in village cricket and so is often incorrectly used to describe a leave or a long barrier.

## Ringer

Comes in two forms. The Gun (as mentioned earlier) and the Novice. The Gun as we've previously mentioned can win you the game single-handedly. The Novice can lose it. Hasn't played since school and only plays because his mate begged him as 'it'll be a good laugh before the pub'.

#### Seed

Another form of the word jaffa but a seed (often used in a sentence as an 'absolute seed') takes wickets. Swings out and hits the top of off, wow!!

## Trigger

The raising of the umpires finger to signal 'out'. Usually referring to the view that the decision was wrong. "I was triggered".

#### Wall

Your 60 year old opening batsman, this is how he's always played. Always good for 30 runs but my god does he bore you getting there. Time to send out an inexperienced umpire to trigger him and get the game going.

## Yes-no-yes

The immortal words from the indecisive batsman as he hits it straight to gully but reckons he'll be safe to run to the non-strikers end. He leaves you stranded, staring at the stumps as a direct hit ends your day.

## Zip


